Historical Committee

Because DWG was established as a Federal subsistence homestead, residents were expected to supplement their incomes by planting gardens and raising livestock to feed their families. It was not a "relief project." Loans for the properties had to be paid back, so applicants had to have jobs in the area. Ten percent of the resident's income had to cover the monthly mortgage payments which averaged \$3 to \$10 over 30 years.

Getting gardens established could be a real challenge. It became easier when in late 1936 a homesteader named Guy Estill became project manager and he and four other colonists pooled their resources and bought a motorized garden tractor which they shared. Marie Tucker, an early resident, explained that DWG residents raised "corn, black-eyed peas, okra (and) things like that."

Environmental stresses like heat, drought, flooding, lightning, animal damage, construction damage, soil compaction and wildfire make trees more susceptible to diseases. Often the best way to prevent tree diseases is to keep trees healthy. Here are some common diseases. Visit Texas A&M Forest Service to learn more on how to keep your trees healthy.

- Oak Wilt An infection starts when sap-feeding beetles pick up spores from infected red oaks and carry them to fresh wounds on other oaks. Once an oak tree becomes infected, this disease can spread to adjacent oaks through root connections. All oak species are susceptible.
- Hypoxylon Canker appears as dead lesions on oak and other hardwood trees and occurs in severely stressed trees. As the tree declines, Hypoxylon kills the wood just under the bark causing the bark to slough, exposing the spore mats.
- Root Rot caused by a fungus that kills woody trunk and root tissues and fine feeder roots. Infection by root rot is often associated with previous wounding; however, it is very common in trees that are over-watered.
- Bacterial Leaf Scorch usually occurs in summer as plants come under heat and water stress. The disease can be diagnosed by the appearance of a yellow halo between the green and scorched tissue on the leaves. It is often incorrectly diagnosed as oak wilt in red oaks.
