As we celebrate our 248th, let all of us remember the sacrifices that were made to ensure a smooth path into our future. Believe me when I tell you, we enjoy freedom that citizens of other countries have no clue about, ranging from freedom of speech to religion and everything in between. As we celebrate the summer season, please join us at city hall for our annual ice cream social on July 13 from 6:30 to 8:30. Ice cream is just one way of connecting with our neighbors. For you history buffs, here's a bit of history about this delightful treat: Ice cream's origins are known to reach back as far as the second century B.C., although no specific date of origin nor inventor has been undisputedly credited with its discovery. We know that Alexander the Great enjoyed snow and ice flavored with honey and nectar. Biblical references also show that King Solomon was fond of iced drinks during harvesting. During the Roman Empire, Nero Claudius Caesar (A.D. 54-86) frequently sent runners into the mountains for snow, which was then flavored with fruits and juices. Over a thousand years later, Marco Polo returned to Italy from the Far East with a recipe that closely resembled what is now called sherbet. Historians estimate that this recipe evolved into ice cream sometime in the 16th century. England seems to have discovered ice cream at the same time, or perhaps even earlier than the Italians. "Cream Ice," as it was called, appeared regularly at the table of Charles I during the 17th century. France was introduced to similar frozen desserts in 1553 by the Italian Catherine de Medici when she became the wife of Henry II of France. It wasn't until 1660 that ice cream was made available to the general public. The Sicilian Procopio introduced a recipe blending milk, cream, butter and eggs at Café Procope, the first café in Paris.

Chief's Message:

At a recent event, several people asked about trends in identity theft and how to protect against it. It's a great topic because criminal tactics and their goals have been changing, not for the better.



To start, what criminals mean when they target an "identity" has been in flux since the turn of the century. Traditionally, this has primarily been about gathering enough real-world information to impersonate the victim in applications for tax refunds, credit lines, and loans. That's still the case, but today, criminal tactics more often target online accounts.

As potential victims—and we are all that—we must safeguard against the theft of information about us in the real world and the digital realm. Let's start with the simpler real world.

The most likely real-world places where information about you will be targeted are your mailboxes (for letters and packages) and your garbage. So we recommend that you take common-sense steps like locking your mailbox, providing a locked area for packages, or using lockers from firms like Amazon. We also recommend using a cross-cut shredder on bills and financial data that you will throw away.

In the digital realm, the landscape is more intricate. The theft of your login and personal data is more likely to occur not from a hacker targeting your computer but from criminals targeting a website that you have entrusted with your data. We hear about these breaches frequently and receive notifications from the sites we use a few times a year about the loss of our data. This underscores the need for vigilance and caution with our online data.

We can't stop websites or our service providers like doctors and accountants from getting hacked. What we can do is understand why criminals are doing this, so that we can make ourselves more difficult to victimize. In a word, the sites are targeted to steal usernames and passwords at scale.

When they steal a million username/password combinations (called "credentials"), it costs criminals literally nothing to use computer programs to try those credentials in other places and see if they work. When they do, professional criminals build dossiers around your online identity. When a criminal finds you've used the same password for an online store and, say, a bank account, they will immediately use computers to try those credentials on the websites of every major online store, credit card company, investment house, and hospital and try those credentials. They will also use a computer to try variants of the password, adding numbers or characters (like 2, or #) at the end for good measure.

That is why we recommend three steps for every resident:

- 1. Strong, unique passwords for every site, stored in a password manager
- 2. Multifactor authentication using an app on your phone, or a hardware token like a Yubikey
- 3. Insist on encryption when you send personal or account information never email records like these.

Passwords are, well, stupid. We're told that they should contain 15 mixed-case letters plus numbers and special characters like @, that they should be different for every site we go to, and we shouldn't write them down — and anyone who says this has never tried to do it because it's impossible. Instead, we need to use password managers.

1. Password Managers

The bottom line: Password Managers are trustworthy, and even the free ones offer protection better than any other system you can use. They use "Zero-Knowledge," meaning that the passwords are encrypted on your computer — no one but you, not even the password manager company, can unencrypt them without the credentials (and we will make that even stronger in step 2).

Some good free password managers are 1Password, KeePass, and BitWarden. To protect the password manager, select a good, strong password and then save every password for every online account in the manager.

2. Multifactor Authentication

Authentication security has three "factors" or types: something you know (like a password or PIN), something you have (like another device), and something you are (like a fingerprint or eye scan). Multifactor means mixing any two or more of these — for example, using a password and a one-time code generated by an app on your phone or a password and a fingerprint.

We recommend that you never use an SMS text message as a second factor unless there is no choice. SMS messages are insecure. Instead, use a free program like Google Authenticator, Microsoft Authenticator, or a paid program like Duo Security. Password managers can also provide a one-time code.

Hardware tokens like Yubikey or Titan are the strongest multifactor tools. They're more complicated to use than one-time password apps, but if you are concerned explicitly about online accounts, we recommend you chat with us about how to deploy these.

3. Insist on Encryption

Our tax guy, bank, or a business we use will often ask us to email details, including credit cards, account numbers, SSNs, and other data. Don't do it. Email is inherently insecure and can be intercepted. Instead, ask them for a secure online portal. If they don't have one, we recommend putting the information in a Word or Google document, uploading that document to Google Drive or M365 SharePoint, and then sharing the document that way, which is encrypted in transit.
