Happy Easter! We are on the cusp pf springtime. Thankfully Punxsutawney Phil did not see his shadow for the 21st time in the 138 year history of this tradition which means that we are in for an early spring. As we begin this new month, I thought I would share a few fun facts about March. The "Ides of March" was a day in the Roman calendar equivalent



to March 15th. It was considered a deadline for settling debts. It was also the day Julius Caesar was assassinated. If you were born in March, your birth flower is a daffodil! March babies are spoiled with two birthstones: aquamarine, and bloodstone which symbolizes courage. March is the equivalent of September in the Southern Hemisphere. Every year, March and June finish on the same day of the week. March is the time of year when animals start waking up from hibernation. The name for March comes from Mars, the Roman god of war. It was named as such in both the Julian and Gregorian calendars. The Vernal Equinox occurs around March 20 or 21st. This is when the sun is directly above the equator, making the day and night equal length. The Anglo-Saxons called March "Hlyd monath" meaning "Stormy month" or "Hraed monath" meaning "Rugged month." The popular social media outlet Twitter was launched on March 21, 2006, with the first tweet going out the same day. It was posted by the founder, Jack Dorsey, which read "just setting up my twttr." Saint Patrick's Day occurs every March 17th, celebrated in many western countries to commemorate the day Saint Patrick died. Easter Sunday is another popular holiday of this month. Originally observed by Christians to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ, my favorite guy, it will fall on March 31 this year. On the secular side, it has now become a holiday involving egg hunting, candy, and the Easter bunny. Statistically, March is the most unproductive month of the year in the U.S. This is the result of "March Madness" which is the season of NBA. Some companies lose up to \$1.9 billion in wages paid to workers who were not productive and instead spent company time on betting on NBA games. Back in the older days, March was when military campaigns would resume that had previously been put on hold for winter. On March 10, 1876, Alexander Graham Bell made the firstever phone call. It was to his assistant and he said "Mr. Watson, come here. I want to see you." The Eiffel Tower was ascended for the first time. Eiffel himself led a group of government officials and members of the press to the top. The elevators were not in operation yet, so the journey was made on foot and took over an hour. President John F. Kennedy founded the Peace Corps on March 1, 1961. It is a successful volunteer organization that has since sent at least 235,000 Americans abroad to developing countries to help with health care, education, and other human needs.

He was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity (Theta Sigma Chapter), Pi Gamma Mu, and Beta Gamma Sigma honor societies. Bud and Marilyn married in 1965, and he began his career which took them around the country. In 1985, he was offered the opportunity to help with the transformation of downtown Ft. Worth when he took a position with the Bass owned City Center Development Co., where he served as President until 2006. He served in many leadership roles: Board President of The Arlington Boys and Girls Club, Board Member of the Ft. Worth Chamber of Commerce (Economic Development), the beginning group for the Ft. Worth Main Street Arts Festival, Board Member of Downtown Ft. Worth, Inc., and President of the Ft. Worth Better Business Bureau. He was also a member of the BOMA International (Building Owners and Managers Association) in which he served as both Ft. Worth and Texas State Presidents. Bud was happiest when he was with his family and was known as Papa to his four grandchildren. It was his huge hugs and great sense of humor that made him so endearing. Much of his leisure time was spent boating and fishing at his Possum Kingdom Lakehouse, indulging his love of music and playing his guitar. He loved animals and had many cats and dogs throughout his life; he was a true "animal whisperer." Bud will be remembered as a gentle giant and a patient, soft-spoken, kind man. He was always willing to help mentor people and was a man of his word. His generosity and his hugs will be missed by everyone who knew him. He leaves behind a grieving family who will forever hold dear their wonderful memories of him. Safety Tip of the month:

As the weather starts to get nicer, we are having lots more people frequenting parks across the area. Park parking lots are easy targets for criminals. It is our goal to raise awareness to this problem and help prevent you from being an easy target. When planning a trip to your local park please make sure to leave all valuables at home, do not leave them in your vehicle. If you have to leave valuables in your vehicle while it is unattended, please put the items in your trunk or in other places where they are out of site. Try to avoid hiding items in obvious areas like globe boxes, and middle consoles.

Car smash-and-grabs happen out of sight and very quickly. Easy items for thieves to take: Cell phones, purse or wallet, laptops, backpacks, shopping backs, cash, and your keys! Ensure that you have locked your vehicle and look through your windows to see if you can spot anything valuable prior to walking away. When walking or running at night park in welllit areas. Always remember trust your instincts if you see something suspicious call 911 and report it immediately. Never confront anyone yourself.

Also, dispatch is manned 24/7 so we can complete the alarm testing whenever works best for your schedule, this process takes less than 10 minutes to complete. If your alarm system is monitored through a third party and you would like information on DWG DPS free monitoring, please let us know.

Solar Eclipse News

Have you noticed the uptick in reports in the news about the upcoming total solar eclipse in our area? A great thing about living in DWG is that you don't have to travel to experience this stunning spectacle of nature.

DWG will be hosting a total eclipse viewing event in Gardens Park on Monday, April 8. The event will include a presentation about solar eclipses, viewing stations with telescopes provided by the Fort Worth Astronomical Society, food trucks and yard games. Bring your picnic blanket or lawn chairs. We will have a great view of the moon's shadow as it approaches across the landscape to temporarily block out the sun. The FAQ tab has a lot of information about how to safely view a solar eclipse, specifics about the DWG event and tips for residents on how to plan around the large influx of people expected into the area. Additional details about parking, shuttles, drop off locations, road closures and commemorative merchandise for purchase will be added to the website soon.
